Tuesday 13th of September saw four of the Year 11 citizenship students attend the Sheila McKechnie "Shout Out" campaigning awards ceremony at St Martin's in the Field.

THE STUDENTS were Shamma, Leena, Olida and Tasmeen. The students identified the River Lea at Bow as a major problem in the local area as it is often treated as a rubbish dump and focussed on this as the basis for their project. The pollutants harm wildlife and spoil the enjoyment of local people who may wish to use this area for recreation. With the help of Ms. Davidson and the staff of Thames 21 who work in cleaning the river, the students made a short film on this very important issue. This was shown in form time and at the floating cinema. Although they did this for their controlled assessment in citizenship the students were also nominated for a campaigning award by the school. The students attended a very formal interview during their work experience. They very ably answered all the questions and impressed the judges so much that they were selected as finalists.

In order to support them in this campaign or future campaigns the foundation awarded them £100 and a one-day workshop with journalists and politicians. Present at the awards ceremony were broadcasters Anna Raeburn and Jon Snow, as well as mathematician Dr Simon Norton who sponsored one of the prizes. The age range at the prestigious event was from school students to 105 year old Hettie Bower who is still campaigning against wars throughout the world. Finalists were from all works of life and from around the world.

Three of our Law students won an interview for a week long internship, and Jahannara impressed them with her legal knowledge enough to win the work placement. This is a great achievement, as Skadden is an internationally recognised legal firm and an internship here is something any trainee barrister would be envious of. Here Jahannara tells us about her internship.



"Hello,
My name is Jahannara (BA5) and I had recently won an internship placement at Skadden, Arps, Slate, Meagher & Flom (UK) LLP: a firm of barristers based in Canary Wharf. Skadden is one of the biggest, most successful global American law firms with 23 offices around the world from New York, to Hong Kong. During my week at Skadden, I worked nine to five shadowing two different lawyers, one who worked in corporate law and the other in litigation. I observed major meetings and presentations, some of which involved important members from other countries. I engaged in a few video calls from New York and Washington DC. I wrote three reports on important past cases that were relevant to certain cases Skadden was dealing with. I also had to research an area of contract law and present my findings to the lawyer whom I was shadowing.
One highlight was a visit to the Commercial Court in London where I was involved in the case of Chelsea Football club owner, Roman Abramovich, whom Skadden is representing. This was extremely exciting for me as I met a billionaire who smiled at me! I also had a lot of cake and coffee over the week, as different legal trainees took me out to cafes just to have a friendly talk about university and give me advise on a legal career. One of the lawyers whom I shadowed for three days also took me out for an expensive meal where I tried scallops for the first time! Overall, my experience there was amazing and everyone there were very welcoming and friendly!"

Our day’s journey began at the magnificent St Paul’s cathedral which was made all the more dramatic because of the anti- capitalism protest camp occupying the surrounds. Our visitors were intrigued by Britain’s very own ‘squatter camp’.

After listening to the angelic sounds of the choir wafting across the cathedral, the party made its way across the previously wobbly bridge, taking in the iconic London skyline which now boasts the slowly growing ‘shard’ skyscraper. The Tate Modern seldom fails to inspire, so it seemed right to stop for refreshments and to view the multi- media art installation occupying the Turbine Hall.

It was a scenic walk along the South Bank which took us to our next destination - the London Eye, where we all piled into our very own pod and used the full 20 minutes

to explore the view. Cameras were flashing as we lifted up slowly and higher into the sky, with landmarks such as Buckingham Palace, Big Ben, the Houses of Parliament and Westminster Abbey competing for our attention. Those who were frightened of heights clung to the seating until we once more returned to trusted terra firma!

With the ground once more firmly under our feet, we made for the Houses of Parliament to view this fine institution up close and followed that with the mandatory trek across the park to Buckingham Palace. Nomzamo JSS & CFGS Partnership

OVER THE LAST FEW YEARS we has seen the rich development of the relationship between Central Foundation Girls' and Nomzamo School of the Eastern Cape, South Africa, and it is with great joy that in November we welcomed Nondaka Hombakazi – one of the teachers from Nomzamo, to London.

On a recent trip to South Africa, Nondaka was selected as the teacher who was best-suited to travel to the UK on a two week educational experience because of her desire to improve the English literacy standards of her students. During her time with us she specifically requested that she observe Year 7 English classes as well as a variety of Drama classes, in order to better develop her understanding of how to use Drama methods to promote literacy at Nomzamo.

Out of this two week visit, a project was born which will be conducted in both countries simultaneously: an English/Drama project that makes use of local newspapers to source potential interviews for a piece of drama that would take the form of a talk-show. Students will adopt the roles of the characters in the story; rehearse their interviews and then perform them whilst being filmed on a mobile phone. The top interview will be sent overseas to the partner school to share good practice and the three South African students with the most improved English will win a prize.

There was just enough time at the end of the visit to review the agreements between the two schools: to reaffirm our commitment to teaching the Environment and Health schemes of work created by the LCD and to continue developing our students' ability to lead healthy lifestyles.

Saying goodbye to Nondaka was a sad experience but made all the more acceptable knowing that, as a result of her journey to the UK, educational standards in both schools will improve

This year our students delved into the delights of **Macbeth**. At the start of the project our students were treated to a workshop with the National Youth Theatre to help them explore the play in more detail. At the close of the project, the cast performed their finished production at the magnificent Unicorn theatre at London Bridge to an audience of 400. This year, we had a record number of parents and students in the audience supporting the production – 54 of them!

While the whole cast acted admirably, outstanding performances were noted: Nasrin Ahmed's noble Macduff; Rosie Elliot-Parson's tragic Macbeth, Gurnam Kaur's majestic King, Karris Terrel's character of the murderer and the highlight of the evening, Faye Guy's cold and calculating Lady Macbeth.
